#### AFMMAA President's Message

And this is my first chance to speak to you as President. I first want to say your **AFMMAA** is healthy. Thanks to your contributions and the contributions of the AFRL/RX employees during the Combined Federal Campaign, we continue to be able to offer significant scholarships to the children and grandchildren of AFRL/RX military and civilian employees. Our summer meeting was the largest gathering of alumni to date. We have just successfully changed to a new set of leaders for the organization. We have continued to be actively engaged with the Materials and Manufacturing Directorate. This is all a result of your participation, so you can be proud of your involvement.

As I just mentioned, we have a new administration for our AFMMAA. We still have a number of people who agreed to stay in their posts but we have a new President, myself, a new Vice President, Matt Di Biase, and we have a new membership chairperson and RX liaison, Neal Ontko, with the continuing assistance of Dick Engman. George Slenski continues as our Secretary and webmaster, even though he is currently remote. Dennis Naughton continues to be the Treasurer and do an excellent job. Charlie Browning is the Scholarship chairperson and has just finished the very difficult task (with his team of AFMMAA volunteers) of selecting three new candidates for scholarships this year. Tom Cooper, who has always done an excellent job with the Newsletter has agreed to stay on, but he has requested that we find a person to replace him. So my first request as your President is to find someone who would volunteer to take over the challenging, but important, position of being the newsletter chairperson. As you know the newsletters come out twice a year, fall and spring, and are a very important way to connect with each of you. George Schmitt continues his role as a vital connection to RX.

One critical fact that I want to make you aware of, at the time I write this, is that this year's **Combined Federal Campaign has been indefinitely suspended** as a result of the government shutdown. The campaign was originally slated to operate from September 1 through December 15. And so campaign contributions were not accepted during the shutdown. The suspension will

remain in place until there's a continuing resolution or congressionally approved appropriation. Currently the suspension includes all CFC events, training and fundraising. As you know, the CFC has been an important contributor to our resources for scholarships and we will keep you apprised as to what happens with this. Each year I have attended the kick off celebration for the CFC with John Williamson. I was planning to do so again this year, in this case with Matt DiBiase, but of course that was all ended when they suspended the CFC.

Another key activity that had happened, of course, was the **furloughing of government employees.** This has had a significant effect on the morale of employees that are currently working in RX and the furlough (Continued on Page 2)

#### **RX** UPDATE

I am still the Acting Director of the Materials and Manufacturing Directorate, despite the fact that the selection committee has chosen a new Director. There's

more on that in a separate article. I am enjoying every minute of it. As you already know, RX is a great place to work and a fantastic organization to lead!

It has been a rough summer and fall for the Air Force and RX. We had furlough over the summer. Most civilians had 6 days of unpaid leave. For some, it was time to spend with family or work on the house; however, it was still a financial hardship. Then, starting on October 1st, the government

shutdown began. All the civilians in RX North (those at Wright-Patt), were able to keep working through the shut down because of the way that they are paid, but our colleagues at Hill, Tinker, and Robins AFB were out on furlough again for 4 days. Starting on the 7th of October, they were also brought back to work, and they will receive back pay for that period of time. Fortunately, I do not expect more furloughs the rest of the fiscal year.

requirements were strict in terms of not allowing them to work additional hours or weekends and they had to take one day of the week off, which was to be a Friday or a Monday. During those times they were not allowed to use their office facilities. There is still the specter of additional furloughs in the current fiscal year. It's certainly a period of great uncertainty.

We recently met with Col. John Gloystein, the Acting Director of the Materials and Manufacturing Directorate, and Dr. Karla Strong, the Assistant to the Director. Here is how I introduced AFMMAA to him:

#### The AFMAA goals are:

- 1) To foster recognition of the importance of the Directorate's contributions to the mission of the Air Force and the US industrial base.
- To provide a structure for the exchange of information related to AFRL/RX, its past and present personnel, its past accomplishments, its current activities, and future needs.
- 3) To promote the activities of persons currently or formerly assigned to AFRL/RX.
- 4) To support the current AFRL/RX organization by undertaking special projects and activities.

I reminded him of the activities that AFMMAA has accomplished in addressing these goals:

- 1) Completing the RX/AFMMAA Heritage Initiative leadership, technologies, and people (historical repository at UTC);
- 2) Producing the Newsletter (Director's message), attending and supporting RX personnel award meetings;
- 3) Having FUN via monthly luncheons and the growing biannual meetings; and
- 4) Continuing to provide valuable scholarships; created the Astronaut Cady Coleman exhibit; offering to review the upcoming RX contributions video; providing gentle reminders (and support) related to the 100th Anniversary Celebration (2017) planning.

Colonel Gloystein pledged his membership. He said that the AFMMAA was the best alumni organization that he has seen in his career. During our meeting with him, he covered some of his concerns over the continuing problems with sequestration(s) and the related furlough(s). We volunteered to contribute, where appropriate, to enhancing the morale of AFRL/RX employees.

We are continuing to have very successful **AFMMAA member monthly luncheons.** They been attended by up to 15 people and, as part of this newsletter, we have included pictures taken at these fun events. I would emphatically encourage each of you, if possible, to attend at some point. We do send out emails reminding you.

On a fun note: we have an opportunity for you to **purchase an RX coin.** Dr. Karla Strong has been arranging to acquire coins at RX. They are reasonably priced at six dollars apiece and AFMMAA will be purchasing multiple coins for resale to you at a later date. Neal Ontko has been instrumental in looking at the cost of shipping and other approaches that we might use to get the coins to you. The earliest we can probably get coins to you will be at the winter meeting that will take place on the morning of the RX awards ceremony in mid-January. Stay tuned.

Neal has also been instrumental in arranging for the **printing and framing of the group photograph** that was taken at our summer meeting at the Engineers Club of Dayton. Currently the plans in AFRL/RX are to hang the photograph in the Heritage Hallway in RX (between 653 and 652) and we plan on including a guide to who are all the people are in the picture. We're not exactly sure when it will be put in place, but we will notify you in the next newsletter.

I also want to briefly remind you of the **new** structure of the Materials and Manufacturing **Directorate.** There are now three operational divisions. The Functional Materials Division works on nano electronic materials, photonics materials, and soft matter materials. The Structural Materials Division has the areas of materials state awareness and supportability (the former NDE branch), composite materials, and metals. The Manufacturing and Industrial Technologies Division is focused on electronics and sensors and on propulsion, structures and manufacturing enterprise. The Systems Support Division includes materials integrity, acquisition systems support, and logistics system support. The former Airbase Technologies Division is now been moved out of AFRL/RX and is now part of the civil engineering activities in the Air Force.

These are changing times for AFRL/RX and the AFMMAA will continue to provide support to employees as possible and to meet the goals that I mentioned earlier. (RX Update continued)

I expect a period of reduced or flat budgets for RX's technical program over the next few years. I believe this is the "new normal" budget environment, and is to be expected as we wind down the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan. After every major engagement since World War II, Defense budgets have dropped. RX will remain focused on long-term, game-changing materials and manufacturing research and development. We will just have to focus more intently on those areas with the biggest payoff to the warfighter.

Additive Manufacturing is a rapidly-developing technology that is capturing the imagination of several senior leaders in DOD. This is the ability to create objects by building them up, layer by layer. They can be polymeric, ceramic, or metallic, or a combination thereof. RX has started an Integrated Project Team on Additive Manufacturing, and we are looking at ways to use it for limited runs of new parts, replacement parts, structures, electronics, and many other Air Force applications. As the materials and manufacturing "center of the universe" for the AF, RX needs to be leading the charge to determine the good, bad, and ugly for additive applications in the near, mid- and far-term.

I continue to be amazed at the quality of the people in RX, whether their efforts are recognized or not. In my opinion, it is the reason why our alumni group is so strong, the reason we weathered the furlough and budget issues so resiliently, and the reason we are so effective in helping the warfighter. I have a new signature line I have been using in all my emails, "From stealth, to supersonics, to supercruise, to hypersonics, new USAF capabilities are unimaginable without materials' advancement." The key word is "unimaginable." We have made (and make) these game changing realities possible through the work we do here in RX.

#### Stand-Down of the Airbase Technologies Division (RXQ) at Tyndall AFB, FL

On 3 September 2013, Col Gloystein, RX's Acting Director, marked the end of an era in RX. He traveled to Tyndall AFB to participate in the formal deactivation ceremony for RXQ. The Airbase Technologies Division became part of AFRL/RX in October 1997 and they had some amazing accomplishments in the past 16 years. RXQ developed new technologies for fighting fires and performing rescues specific to military aircraft, including

those involving jet fuel and composite materials. They also developed technologies that provided protection from blasts, including IEDs, and chem/bio contamination, and helped with relief efforts in Haiti during Operation Unified Response in 2010. RXQ was a superb contributor to improving safety for the warfighter and civil aviation.

Many of RXQ's functions will be transferred to the Air Force Civil Engineering Center, but some will not. Ultimately, the AF will follow industry's lead in some areas, where we previously led technical developments. The budget decision was a painful one, but it in no way reflected negatively on the great work by the folks in RXQ. All the RXQ military and the civilian personnel found great new assignments or were able to retire.

## SELECTION OF A NEW DIRECTOR OF THE MATERIALS AND MANUFACTURING DIRECTORATE

The process for the selection of a new RX Director has been moving forward, and a new Director has been selected by the committee. However, any new Director has to be approved by the permanent Secretary of the Air Force, and that person has to have been in that position for at least 90 days. Currently, there is an Acting Secretary, so RX will have to wait for a new Secretary to be confirmed and then an additional 90 days before the Director can be officially appointed. The President has nominated Deborah Lee James to be the new Secretary of the Air Force, but her confirmation has been placed on hold in the Senate. Until a new Director is appointed, Col Gloystein will be the Acting Director. RX is not expecting to have a new Director until around February 2014.

## AFMMAA Merit Scholarship Program

# 2012 USAF WINNER OF THE A1 COMMUNITY AWARD FOR AFFIRMATIVE EMPLOYMENT (AEP) AND SPECIAL EMPHASIS PROGRAM (SEP)

## Bronze Star for Meritorious Service in Support of Operational Enduring Freedom

Special Agent Capt Todd J. Turner, who is also a civilian scientist working in the Air Force Research Laboratory's Materials and Manufacturing Directorate, received the Bronze Star Medal during a ceremony at the Directorate on September 18th. Capt Turner received the Bronze Star, the fourth-highest individual military award, for meritorious service while conducting operations as part of his reserve duty in Afghanistan in support of Operation Enduring Freedom.

According to the award citation, Capt Turner distinguished himself through meritorious achievement as an operations officer with the Air Force Office of Special Investigations, second field investigations region, 24th Expeditionary Field Investigations Squadron at Bagram Airfield in Afghanistan. Col Curtis Riedel, the commander of the Air Force Office of Special Investigations First Field

Investigations Region at Wright-Patterson AFB, presented the medal to Capt Turner.

Capt Turner and his team were engaged in ground operations against an opposing armed force from September 2012 until April 2013. During this period, he fused tactical intelligence collection disciplines with counterpart direct action capabilities into a dominating, synergistic force to find, fix, track and neutralize enemy forces. Capt Turner directed five agent collection teams on 126 combat missions in hostile environments.

He personally led teams on 47 missions, including sensitive site exploitation, and a detainment operation against a Taliban cell leader. Capt Turner also led informant operations that resulted in the capture of weapons caches, including explosive rockets and devices. Further, he conducted 517 informant meets, generating intelligence information reports valuable in the identification of 521 targets, and ultimately the capture of 16 insurgents. Removal of these lethal threats enhanced the security of over 37,000 base personnel and enabled coalition forces to maneuver uninterrupted.

"The exemplary leadership, personal endeavor and devotion to duty displayed by Agent Turner in this responsible position reflects great credit upon himself and the United States Air Force," the citation concluded.

In his capacity at RX, Dr. Turner also received accolades for his work with the High Energy Diffraction Microscopy Team. In early 2013, the team received the Robert T. Schwartz Engineering Achievement Award for developing the world's first tool that simultaneously gathers data from multiple detectors during sample deformation.

Chartered to study grain interaction of materials at the microscopic level during deformation, the team, which included Dr. Jay Schuren and Dr. Paul Shade, identified the limitations of current characterization methods and provided a solution to combine multiple disciplines for first, real-time view of damage evolution.

#### TED BARTLING AFRL/RXSS (AT HILL AFB) DONATES KIDNEY

In September, RX's Ted Bartling donated a kidney to a stranger, saving three people's lives. An article was written about him on Yahoo's Shine website, which is paraphrased below:

Bartling's incredible sacrifice set in motion a chain of events that linked six people and allowed three, including a 2-year-old boy, to receive successful kidney transplants. All three recipients and their donors are thriving.

"For at least 15 years, donating a kidney had been on my mind as something I could do to help somebody live a normal life like mine," Bartling told Yahoo Shine. "They'll only take a kidney up until you're about 60. I can do small things for people, but sometimes we have to do the bigger things if we are capable."

Apparently, he picked the perfect moment. There were three patients in need, but no matches. Juan Romero, 45, who has a rare B- blood type, had been on a waiting list for three years and was on dialysis. Brandy Jess, 40, also on dialysis, had a donor — her friend Kristy Buffington — but at the 11th hour, a final test revealed they were incompatible. And then there was 2-year-old Beckham Fershtut, whose parents Ari and Hayley wanted to give him a kidney but weren't good matches.

Beckham was only weeks away from starting dialysis. For a 2-year-old, it's incredibly difficult and would probably shorten his lifespan. The boy's father made it clear that he was willing to donate a kidney to a stranger if someone else had an organ for his son. When Ted came forward with his donation, suddenly the pieces fell into place. Bartling was a match for Brandy, her friend Kristy was able to donate her kidney to little Beckham, and his father Ari was a match for Romero.

Because of Bartling's courage and generosity, Beckham waited only a month for a kidney. "If it had been years," said his doctor, "he might not have survived."

#### Retiree ID's

Retired civilians must update IDs by January. The Air Force is urging civilian retirees to get a secure Defense Department Civilian Retiree Card - if they haven't already. From the Air Force Times: "Retired Air Force civilians and their dependents must ensure they have up-to-date identification cards by January if they want to continue to use base morale, welfare and recreation facilities. In early 2014, installations will no longer accept AF354 - Air Force Form 354, Civilian Identification Card - for access. Instead, retired civilians must have a Department of Defense Civilian Retiree ID Card or other access credentials, Air Force Personnel Center officials said."

## COMMAND CIVILIAN AWARD FOR VALOR PRESENTED TO TWO RXERS

On 24 July, RX hosted a ceremony to present the Command Civilian Award for Valor to Dr. Greg Schoeppner and Dr. Kevin Kendig, both in RXCC. Gen McCasland, then Commander of the Air Force Research Laboratory, was genuinely touched and honored to be able to present this award to them for their quick and clear-headed reaction to a colleague who was experiencing a heart attack. As the award citation said, "Their willingness to take initiative to provide leadership and medical assistance in a life-threatening emergency is most commendable and reflects credit upon themselves and the United States Air Force."

Several years ago, RX's former Director, Dr. Kathy Stevens, decided to fund the purchase of some Automatic External Defibrillators (AEDs) as well as set aside time to train RX's workforce, both government and contractors, to use them. Several dozen people were trained to use the AEDs over the years. Then, early this summer, a UDRI employee suddenly became very dizzy and began to collapse onto the ground. Two other UDRI employees, Mark Ruddell and Jenny Pierce, eased him to the floor and made the emergency call to 911. The victim had stopped breathing and had no pulse, so Greg and Kevin began CPR and retrieved and used the AED located just down the hall. After a few minutes, he was revived, and a few minutes later, the paramedics arrived and took him to the hospital. The thoughtful actions of Greg, Kevin, Mark and Jenny saved his life.
