The History of the Man Tech Division dates back to 1947 when it was the Manufacturing Methods Unit of the Industrial Planning Division.

The Air Force Systems Command was established in 1961. Materials Central became the Directorate of Materials and Process, though for many years it was still called Materials Central. At that time the Manufacturing Methods Division of the Aeronautical Systems Center became the fifth laboratory of Materials Central (Manufacturing Technology Laboratory).
