ML Director's Message

Dear Alumni, I am pleased to share with you what has taken place at the Materials and Manufacturing Directorate in the six months since I last wrote to you. First and foremost, on 12 February, Gen Bedke and the technical directorates were briefed on their performance during last October's Scientific Advisory Board review. Remember from my last letter that the focus of the 2007 review included one of RX's Core Technical Competencies (CTC): Support for Operations and six sub-core technical competencies: metals, nanomaterials, surfaces and interfaces, ceramics, hybrids and NDE. The chart below illustrates the results of the review and reflects the commitment of everyone in RX to maintain our reputation for excellence in the area of materials and manufacturing research.

SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM UPDATE

The 2008 AFMMAA Scholarship Program is off and running. This year's program began with the usual solicitation of applicants through the RX intranet in March. This year the AFMMAA Executive Board voted to change the scholarship eligibility criteria to allow only applicants who are sons or daughters of RX government employees. Therefore, sons and daughters of the RX full-time contractor staff are no longer eligible for AFMMAA scholarships. The reason for this change is that it is planned that current and future funding for the AFMMAA scholarship program will come from donations to the AFMMAA through the Combined Federal Campaign (CFC) by RX government employees. Since the RX contractor staff cannot contribute to CFC, the Board felt that the scholarship program should exclude the contractor staff.

In spite of the change in eligibility criteria, we have experienced the highest number of applicants received since the AFMMAA started awarding scholarships in 2002. The 2008 application deadline was 15 May, and we have received nine applications for the two \$1000 scholarships we plan to award. A team of five volunteers, in addition to the Committee Chair, will help review the applications and meet later in June to determine the two awardees. The volunteer reviewers this year are Walt Griffith, George Schmitt, John Speers, Gary Waggoner, John Williamson and Bob Cochoy, Chairman. The AFMMAA is in line to receive approximately \$1870 from the fall 2007 CFC, which should almost cover the cost of the two planned 2008 scholarships.

COMBINED FEDERAL CAMPAIGN

We Did It Again!

We have been advised that our 2008 application for the Miami Valley Combined Federal Campaign (CFC) of Champaign, Clark, Clinton, Darke, Fayette, Greene, Miami, Montgomery, Preble, Shelby, and Warren Counties, Ohio has been approved. This is the third consecutive year that we have been approved to participate, meaning that the AFMMAA will be listed in the CFC Contributor's Information Guide and we will be eligible to receive contributions for use in our Scholarship Program. As a result, the current "Materials Lab" employees will have the option and opportunity to designate the AFMMAA as a recipient for all or a portion of their contributions for 2008. Hopefully, the number and amount of contributions from the Lab employees will continue to increase so we can

award larger value scholarships to the sons and daughters of the AFRL/RX government workforce. The 2008 Campaign will begin on 1 October and end 14 November 2008

AFRL/RX ALUM WINS AWARD

Don Stevison, former AFRL/RXPJ employee and member of the AFMMAA, received a significant award. He was recently inducted into the National Four-String Banjo Hall of Fame! Don, a resident of New Carlisle, received this outstanding award for his contributions to four-string banjo education and instruction. He retired from RX in 1991. As part of the American Banjo Museum in Oklahoma, the Hall of Fame honors banjo players who opt to strum with four strings – a relic of ragtime and early jazz, rather than five strings. The article in the Dayton Daily News also recognized him for another significant achievement – he helped formulate a better moustache wax. In the early 80's, he and a few bandmates in the Kettering Banjo Society, all of whom have handlebar moustaches, acted as guinea pigs to assist a company (Nestle) find the right combination of ingredients for a good moustache wax. They went through 209 combinations to select the best one. Congratulations to Don for these significant accomplishments!

It was a fun, exciting and action packed week for all of us, but after fitting a months worth or activity into four days I know everyone was ready to get back home. The feedback received from both the participants as well as the mentors has been overwhelmingly positive, with many of the participants, after having seen the opportunities that exist at these locations, expressing a strong interest to pursue future assignments in the space launch and operational areas. I believe these trips to be an excellent investment in our junior force; not only do the participants get a better picture of the total Air Force but also they understand that their supervision, from their branch chief to the AFRL deputy commander, believes that it's important to spend time, energy and resources to develop the people who will eventually be where they are now.

Offsite Brings RX Leadership Together

Finally, I would like to share with you the details of the RX Leadership Offsite (RLO) held May 5th and 6th at the Dayton Racquet Club and attended by the RX supervisors and technical leadership across all five directorate locations. The RLO was created in response to Gen Bedke's directive that each TD hold their own offsite to

communicate the message to their directorate's individual supervisors and technical leaders as it was presented at the AFRL Senior Leader Offsite back in February. The two main points of his message were (1) the value of the AFRL strategy to laboratory personnel and (2) how each Technical Directorate's leadership can best develop and engage its people on a day-to-day basis.

Day one of the RLO was devoted to laying out the vision of how we will develop our people in RX. We began by outlining a new process to ensure summer hires are integrated into the directorate's mission and are collaborating with one another on technical matters throughout their time with us. Next, RX Junior Force Council President Darnell Diggs shared the results of an informal survey he conducted with several military and civilian junior force members on what they see as the great and not-so great things about working in RX. Dr Farmer then gave an assessment on the effectiveness of the RX 101 seminar series and the day culminated in the rollout of a new tool to assist our supervisors in developing the people working for them – the Individual Development Plan (IDP). The goal of the IDP is to create a living document that captures the career desires of the new employee when they arrive and integrates those desires into their career progression plans and milestones.

Day two began with Mr. Jack Blackhurst presenting the strategic plan vectors showing where AFRL is headed, how it will get there and how every directorate and every individual has a role to play in making it happen. Later, attendees were placed into cross-divisional breakout groups to share their perspectives in answering three questions: (1) What about the way RX does business helps us achieve the AFRL Strategy (2) What about how RX does business hinders us from achieving the AFRL strategy and (3) How best to address and fix those hindrances. Over the next three months I will be compiling a list of changes or best practices that have been made as a result of the information shared at the offsite. I look forward to sharing those best practices with you in my next letter to you and as I expressed to you in my last letter we will continue to institute the changes, execute world class materials and manufacturing research, and search out opportunities to make RX an even stronger member of the AFRL and AF team.

very hard to stay in touch with folks who migrate away from the Dayton area post-retirement. However, in spite of good intentions, we have not made any real effort to capture the interest and participation of the significant RX organizational element, RXQ (Airbase Technologies Division) located at Tyndall AFB, FL. A little RX history provided by George Schmitt reveals that RXQ has been a member of the RX (then ML) family since 1997 when AFRL was first stood up. It was formerly the Environics Directorate and actually reported through the old Armstrong Laboratory at Brooks AFB, TX. However, the Airbase Technology Branch of RXQ was a branch of the old AF Flight Dynamics Laboratory (previously VA; now RB) although located at Tyndall AFB. Because one of the AFRL formation rules was that satellite locations would move with the main organization during consolidation into AFRL, the Airbase Branch came with the Environics Directorate and all became RXQ (MLQ at the time). Environics originally came out of the Air Force Civil Engineering Center to Armstrong Lab and then to ML/RX because RX was already managing the pollution prevention materials part of their mission and it didn't logically fit elsewhere.

An exception to our lack of involvement with RXQ is the AFMMAA scholarship program, where we have received several applications and made one award in recent years to an RXQ family member. I would like to build on this beginning and work with current RXQ leadership and retirees to see if we might establish an AFMMAA "Florida Chapter" (or some other concept) in the coming year. Again, thanks to George Schmitt, I have identified several points of contact in Florida and at RXQ and will follow up with them in the next couple of months. If you have other ideas as to how to approach this, or would like to be a part of it, please let me know.

Jerry Persh, inspirational leader of the DOD materials development community for nearly four decades, has been selected by the AFMMAA Executive Committee as an Honorary Lifetime Member. This prestigious award was presented on 22 May 2008 at the Recognition Dinner held for Mr. Persh at the Keck Center of the National Academies in Washington, DC. The Dinner was held as part of the First Persh Conference May 21-23 2008, which was sponsored by the Defense Science and Technology Reliance 21. The Conference, which was by invitation only, was held at the SAI Executive Conference Center in Arlington, VA. and was Chaired by Dr. Tia Benson Tolle, AFRL/RX.
